## **Excerpt / reproduction**

LAW ON ADULTERY. 'When a husband catches his wife in the act of adultery, he shall no longer be permitted to cohabit with her. If he does so, he shall be punished with atimia\*. Similarly, a woman caught in the act of adultery is forbidden from attending national religious ceremonies. If she does so, she may be subjected to any kind of treatment, up to – but not including – death\*\*, with impunity.'

<sup>\*</sup> atimia : comes from the ancient Greek ἄτιμία and literally means 'deprivation of honour' or 'loss of civil rights'.

<sup>\*\*</sup> The law prohibits killing an adulterous woman — even though it permits violence, humiliation, expulsion, and religious and social sanctions.
